1948 After the war, our country was in ruin. In this moment of darkness, the fighting spirit of Filipinos sparked. One spark beamed from the hearts of some men who wanted to organize the Jaycee movement in the country. These men held their first meeting on Sept 25, 1947. On Jan 3, 1948, the Manila Junior Chamber of Commerce was formally organized at the Manila Hotel. Not long after, the spark became a blazing fire leading to the official formation of the Philippine Jaycees. From thereon, the Jaycee Movement became a reflection of what is happening in the country, decade after decade.

VANGUARD OF DEMOCRACY

1950's The fire in the hearts of the pioneering Jaycees was all consuming spreading like wildfire in many parts of the country. After WWII, communism grew in the country. The United States government, tapped the Philippine Jaycees to organize an anti-communist league. Ramon V. del Rosario was very first president elected and Joaquin "Jake" V. Gonzales became the very first Jaycee Senator of the Philippines.

A NEW HOME, STRONGER FOUNDATION

1960's During the rocking and rolling decade of the 60's, the Philippine Jaycees focused on leadership trainings and cause-oriented projects. The decade of the 60's witnessed how the national headquarters was transferred from one location to another. And finally, a permanent Jaycee building was constructed and inaugurated in Quezon City. It was also the same year, when the JCI Senate of the Philippines was formally established.

- Adopted the "Ten Outstanding Policemen of the Philippines" as a national project

- Introduced the first "Leadership in Action" Seminars and "Chapter and Individual Development" Courses



SHINING THROUGH, BREAKING BARRIERS

1970's The advent of the decade of the 70's saw the height of student activism in the country. Always a catalyst of change, the Jaycee movement did not take the back seat. Within its own organization, JCP saw the need to update its By-Laws. But as the country plunged into Martial Law, the Philippine Jaycees changed track and concentrated on social services and projects that were harmonious with the new society. The decade of the 70's also witnessed another surge of membership growth and marked historic events and accomplishments.

- Initiated "Kilusan sa Kaunlaran Kapitbahay" Project in support to the Neighborhood Development Association Program
- Formalized the organization of the Philippine Junior Jaycees
- Had a lady Jaycee officer elected to the National Board for the first time
- Audaciously declared 15,000 registered members to JCI at the end of 1978
- Vigorously implemented community projects in relation to JCI's Major Emphasis Theme, "Opportunities for Children"

1980's The political turbulence in the first half of the decade of the 80's did not deter the Philippine Jaycees to continue with its social services and leadership trainings. In the second half of the decade, the Jaycee movement had again taken an active role in the country's national and political affairs and continued in its pursuits to achieve excellence. Before the decade ended, the Philippine Jaycees settled its past and present financial obligations with a surplus of Php 130,000.

As an opening salvo, the Jaycees participated in various undertakings to spur economic activity nationwide as well as to pursue other distinguished endeavors. This decade upgraded training for leadership skills of its members and spearheaded more worthy causes.

The Jaycees linked up with international groups for social services programs and was even awarded "The Most Outstanding National President in the World" in the person of Gerardo C. Sevilla.

The JCI Impact Projects are being rolled out to 100% of chapters to ensure that local initiatives are aligned and executed properly.

The main theme of the 2017 JCI World Congress is WeDO 2030!, which focuses on the following sustainable development goals: Quality Education, Decent Work and Economic Growth, Reduced Inequalities, and Climate Action.

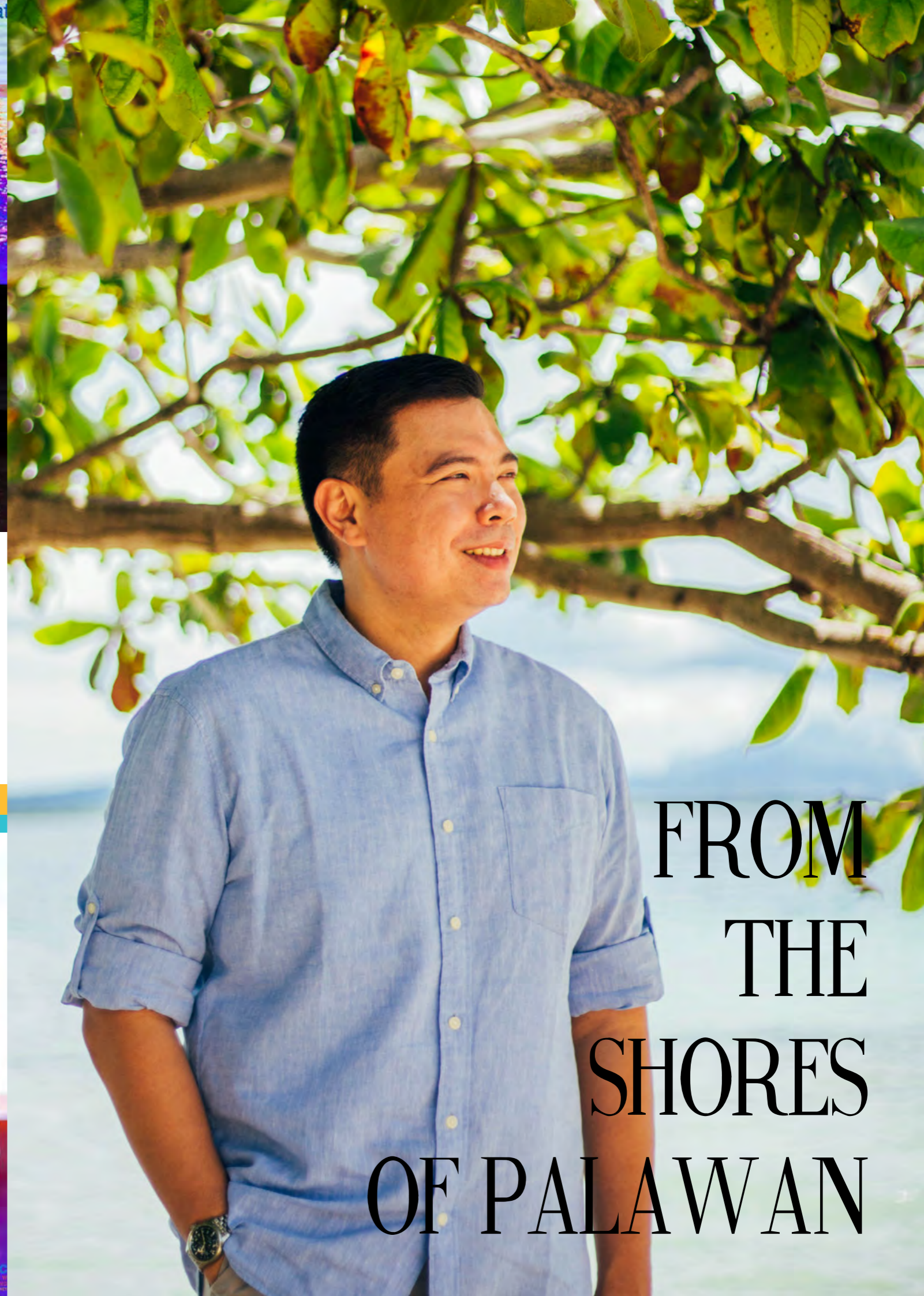

of months of preparation and all I could think of was how truly blessed I was to have been given such a daunting task, and even more blessed because of the people I have met, the friends I have made, the bridges that were crossed, and the relationships that were strengthened.

that the venue for this interview was like a vacation: the fine white sand, the clear blue skies, and the sound of the ocean waves gently lapping on the shore. It would be the ideal paradise to most people, but to 2018 NP Rix Rafols, it is just another regular day at work- at Cowrie Island, at least.

For a person with such a busy schedule, a stop at a tropical island would be the last thing on his itinerary. But considering that he still finds time to help out in their family business each time he goes back to his hometown and sneak in some meetings with local JCI chapters, one might be prompted to ask, how does he do it all? We took some time out to ask him just that and more, as we sat down and had a talk with the man, our 2018 JCIP National President.

BEFORE BEING IN YOUR POSITION NOW, WHAT WAS YOUR MOTIVATION IN JOINING JCI? HOW DID YOU START YOUR CAREER IN JCI?

I would always say that JCI was always in my blood, having grown up in a family where everyone was involved in socio-civic duties and activities. As early as I could recall, it was my dad who was one of the people who inspired me to join JCI, having been an active member of one of the earliest local chapters of JCI in the province. But the person who was really able to convince me was my good friend Alex-because I saw how JCI changed him. From an introvert who would shyly reply to a person, local chapter President, from barely speaking in an entire meeting to a person who gave talks who was able to expand his circle.

I kind of saw myself in him, I saw myself in Alex. See he started as a person who was incredibly shy for a 6'2 guy who says very few words in every meeting- to a person who gradually became brave enough to speak before people. I saw his growth, and as a person, he flourished.

It was devastating when we lost him only after a few years of me being actively involved in JCI. Alex inspired me, and in turn, it inspired me to look beyond myself. I came to look up



to my members at that time, who were all so supportive not only of me as a leader, but what they believed I was capable of.

As for my motivation, it may sound cliché, but it was all because of family. It started with my dad, who, while I was growing up, was very active in JCI. Through him I realized that it wasn't just an organization. It was a lifestyle. He was so supportive and proud of all the accomplishments that we've had and were able to achieve.

WERE THERE ANY PROJECTS IN PARTICULAR THAT INSPIRED YOU?

I can recall a few notable ones. Well a project and a situation. There was one night that I was talking to certain people about a project that I wanted to do. To get an idea, I met with some distant relatives that were senior citizens, as it was a project for the benefit of senior citizens. While meeting with them I realized that I couldn't understand where to get help and who to work with in order to help them. Enter JCI: and just then I was given a network of people who were ready to extend a helping hand.

A Bags to School project that we had at Bidang, Española. There was one project in particular where we went to a far-flung village in southern Palawan. It was one of our most memorable projects because we almost didn't make it home, as the rain flooded a bridge that we had to cross. We were preparing ourselves for the worst that night-but luckily, we still made it back. The reason why I loved that project so much was seeing people grow. Seeing the personalities of the people change in a span of hours, through the phases of doing a project. It was a great experience because it was that project that made me realize that JCI was something that made me go beyond above and beyond volunteerism.

And lastly, TOYM. The thing with TOYM is that one of the reasons why I personally endorse this project is that when I was a kid struggling in to be of use to society, I found myself wanting to be a TOYM awardee. I wanted to be in league with the people who were labelled as movants for change,

examples of excellence, and of course, given such a prestigious accolade. It gave me a small flicker of hope, that would later evolve into a sense of purpose, a goal-I aimed to be excellent. (this may or may not be a work in progress) (laughs)

It's such a prestigious award, and I found out that JCI was the award giving body- group of young leaders who promote a better tomorrow. Later on, I realized how JCI works and why they give out such a prestigious award. My personal take on the awards is that we give out the awards not just because this person is the best at what he does but because he has done something to make society a better place. And because this person is the best representation of his purpose, his mission.

CAN YOU WALK US THROUGH OUR ATTITUDE AND STYLE OF LEADERSHIP IN JCI?

I am all for inclusion, on what everyone can bring to the table. First, I talk about what we want to accomplish. I shared vision which will be like a target that all of us will be aiming for. Second, I delegate, which I have to admit, was something I didn't do before. This taught me to listen. As a leader it is vital to listen, you have to know your points, your weaknesses. You have to share a vision with your members, and together you all find ways to achieve it. (continued on page 18)

Being a businessman also influenced my leadership, in a way. It made me a determined person, determined in a sense that I am willing to do whatever it takes to explore options, because as an employer you always have to have the best interest of your employees in mind, always. It taught me to think about others first before you think about yourself. This habit of keeping track of others taught me to adjust my method-it taught me to listen first, and then to let people manifest the vision that we share.

HOW DO YOU BALANCE YOUR SCHEDULE?

How? There is no balance to speak of. (laughs) But really, for this year I am all in for JCI. But no matter how hectic things may seem to get, I try and make way to see and spend time with the people who matter, both in and out of JCI. I always, always make time for my family and friends, if the schedule permits.

WHAT'S NEXT WITH RIX AFTER BEING THE NATIONAL PRESIDENT?

After this? Cook! (smiles) It's been a while since I was able to go back and experiment in the kitchen, and I am really excited to be able to do that. Also, I want to look for new haunts and new food in my hometown; to look for and find authentic Palawean dishes and to explore more of Palawan. It has so much to offer, not only in terms of the places and the beaches-but the culture and the history of it all. There is so much more places I haven't seen here. Who knows I might even make a blog out of it. (laughs)



HOW DO YOU WANT TO BE REMEMBERED AS NATIONAL PRESIDENT?

Hmmmm that's a hard one. When I started, I remember I was asked what my goal was, what I wanted to achieve; it was simply to at least change one person's life. I think at the ends it added more significance to what JCIP does, to be able to go to a community and see what JCIP has done for that community. When I look at it that way, each project is more than just that. It makes you go further into your service. I want to be remembered as the NP who went above and beyond volunteerism, and a person who inspired others to do the same. *Aspire to Inspire, ika nga.*

WHO IS RIX IN PALAWAN AND WHO IS HE TO HIS CHAPTER?

NP Rix is considered as one of the "pillars" of the chapter. Contrary to popular belief, he is a pretty laid back person, just like your regular tito who can chill with a cup of coffee on a summer afternoon. But kidding aside, he is the kind of person that you can always go to for advice or to just have a good time with. He's incredibly supportive too, of his members and all the endeavors that that they choose to pursue, and is always ready to help in whatever way he can.

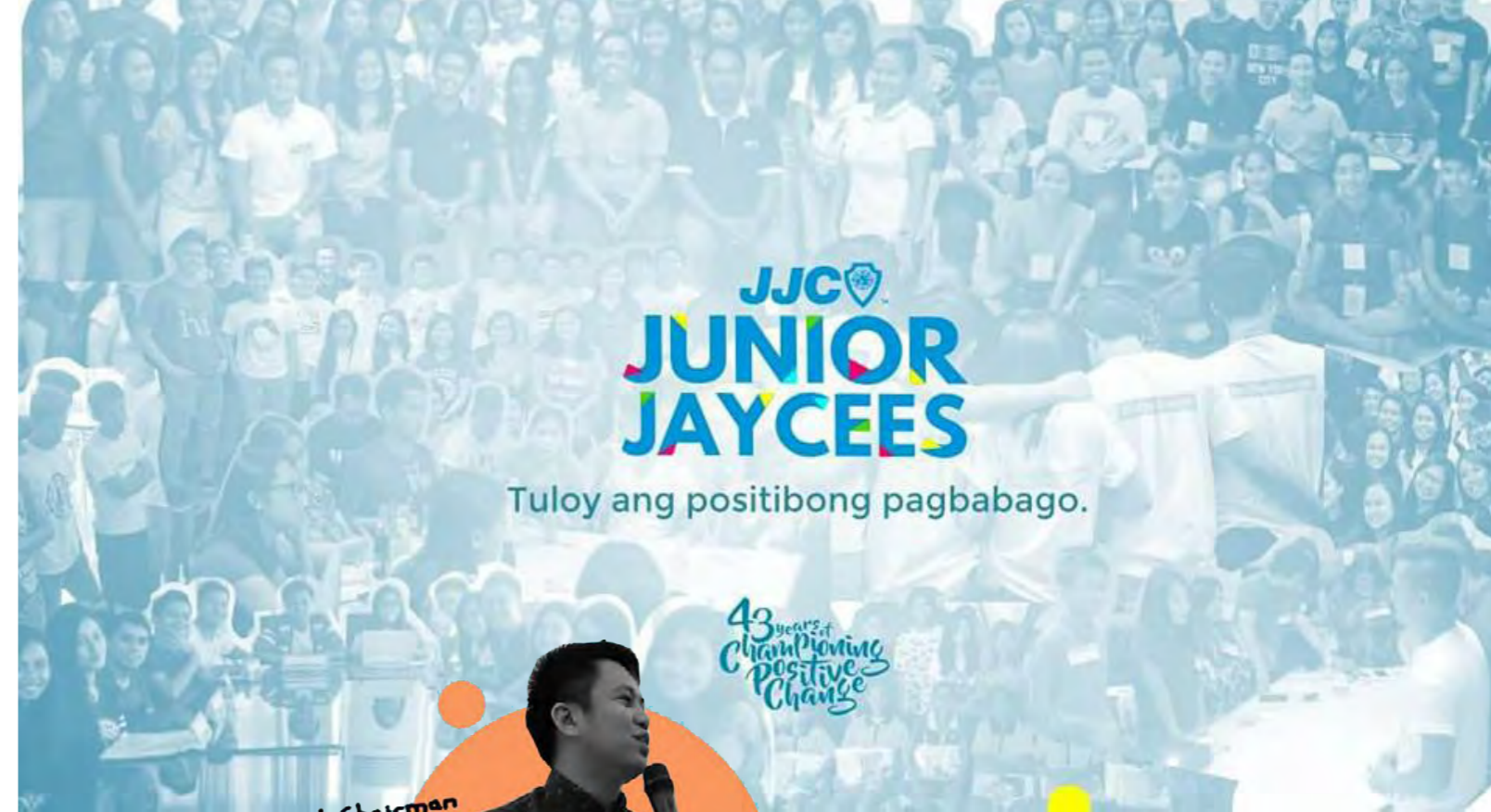

A lot of things were going through my mind. It was a jam-packed weekend and so much was happening at the same time. Rollercoaster. Yeah, you can say that.

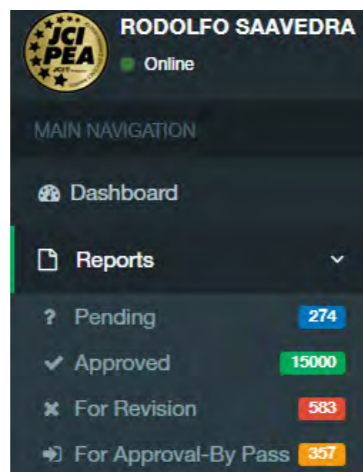

JCIPEA Assessment.

With the help of JCI Performance Efficiency Awards (JCIPEA) National Chairperson Ryan Orcullo and Deputy Chair Johnny Montalan both from JCI Imus Wagayway, the Office of the NSG embarked on a category-by-category assessment of the annual awards program. Notable among the revisions proposed and approved by the National Board during Regular Meetings were as follows:

- Conduct of general membership meetings – Quorum required, points allocation increased from 1 to 3 points per GMM.
- Standardization of attendance points distribution:
 1. Local level - 3 points
 2. Regional level – 5 points
 3. Area level – 10 points
 4. National level – 15 points
 5. Asia Pacific – 20 points
 6. World Congress – 25 points
- Increase of points allocation for bids and judges to encourage more local organizations to participate in the awards system
- Increase of points allocation for priority projects under UNSDGs
- Standardization of points allocation for public speaking and debating competitions.
- JCIPEA inclusion of National Training Directorate priority agenda namely – ACTivate, Ignite, training and co-hostings during the National Training Month.
- Setting of membership growth maximum points to be earned to 200% based from the previous year's declaration. This is to prevent local organizations from gaining an upper-hand in the JCIPEA system by merely paying for the annual dues of more and more members.
- Peace is possible commitment campaign points allocation



These are just some of the more prominent changes implemented this year. Along this line, the Office of the NSG was on point in releasing guidances to local organizations to ensure that they

are well-informed of the key developments in the JCIPEA system. These memoranda and circulars are as follows:

To keep everyone in the loop, the ONSG also issued twelve (12) Circulars and seven (7) Memoranda. From the circular on Official Logos and Tarp Template, the 2018 LO Presidents Tool Kit, JCI Senate Endorsement and Awarding Guidelines, Bid Submission for 2020 JCI NatCon Hosting and the Automatic Leave of Absence for upcoming Barangay Elections, all these were done to guide not only the NB members, LO Presidents, Boundless – the Infinity Secretaries but all the members of the national organization.

All in all, a total of 50 issuances were released through the Office of the NSG.

Also, in an unprecedented move, the Office of the NSG through the assistance of Pres. In conclusion.

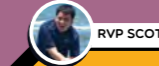

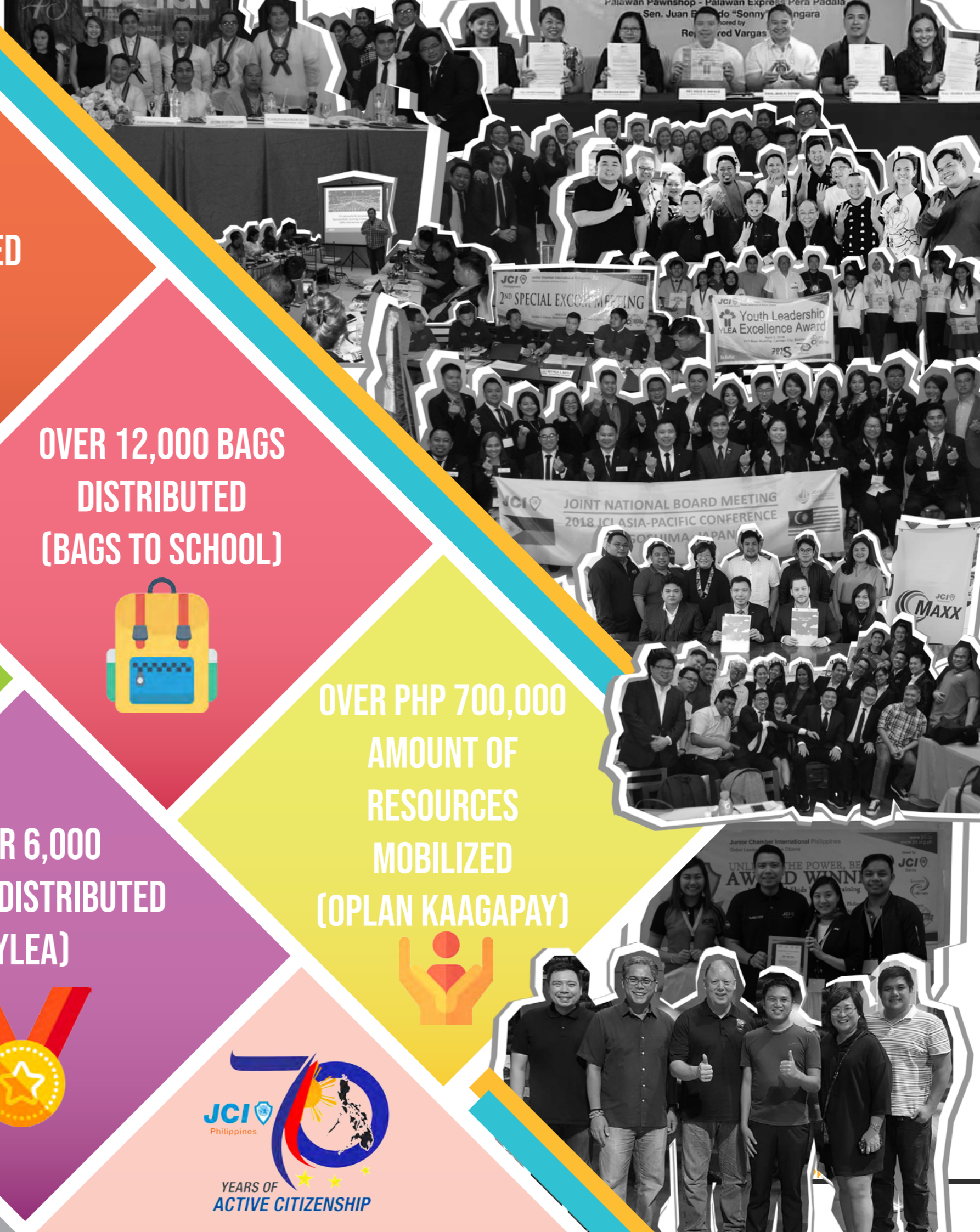

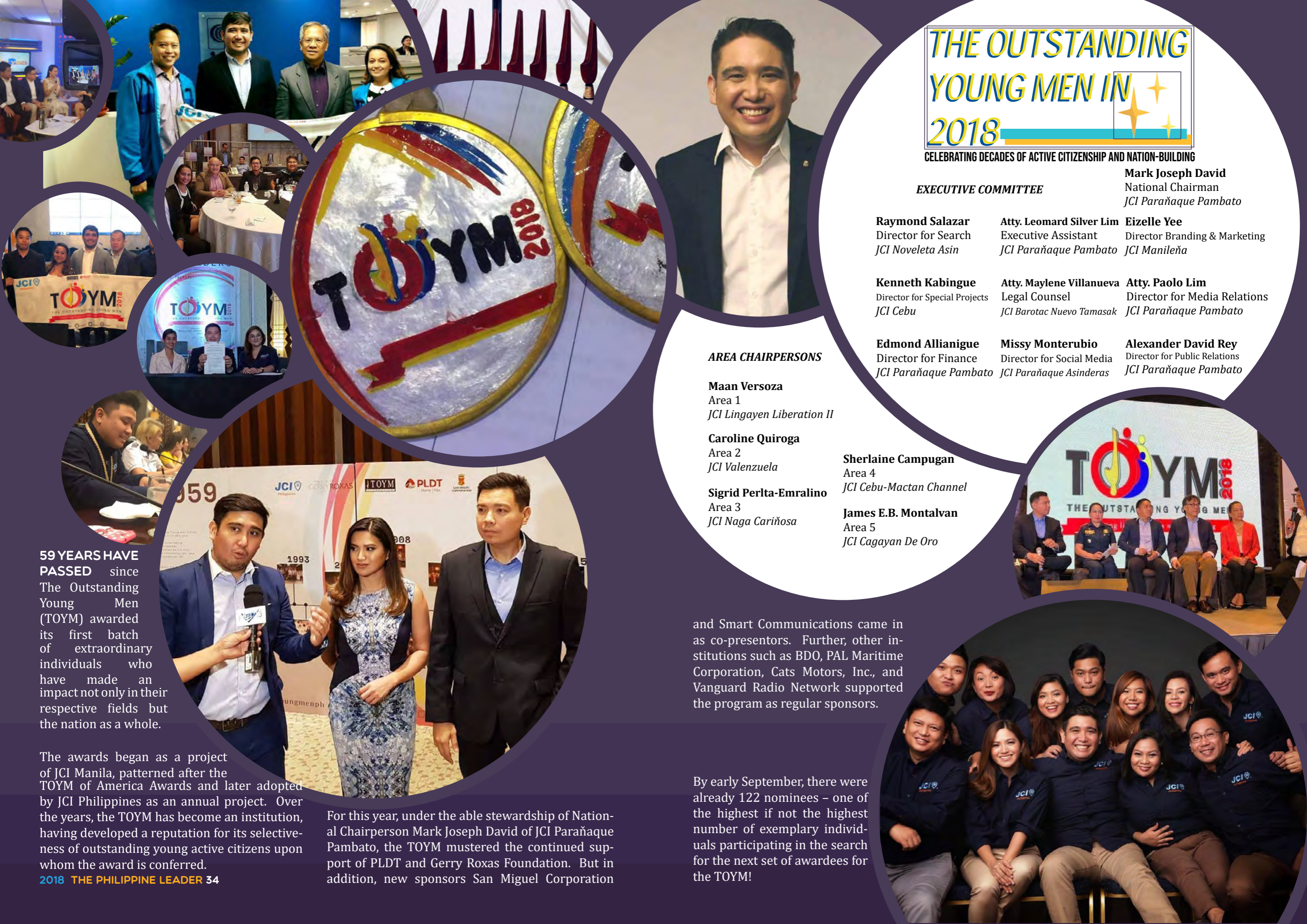

JCI Legazpi and JCI Senate Legazpi brainstormed and took the challenge of creating something that keeps this Filipino culture and ingenuity, while at the same time expand the versatility and use of our ordinary Kariton. Through the efforts of JCI Sen. Yves Eli Yu, 2013 LO President of JCI Legazpi, the concept was made into a reality.

Wherein "E" in the E-Kariton stands for Emergency, Education, and Entertainment. The organization envisions this project to be used during disasters or during community outreach programs to further the information drive of the organization.

This kariton has a 200w solar power with a 150 ah battery, it can provide both 220v and 12v power. E-Kariton comes with it a storage area to help transport whatever item it needs for its deployed function.

Since it has stored power, various modern technologies can be included in it. From providing wifi to having AI's helping it in its function.

PROJECT SPECTACLES WAS INITIATED OVER 10 YEARS ago by then ever active Associate Member Ferdinand Bong Ubayubay It aims to give free prescription eyeglasses to under-privileged kids who cannot afford and needed it the most. As an optometrist, Doctor Ubayubay knew that these kids and teenagers ages 15 to 18, is in the crucial age where eyes would alter and some would need adjustments thru glasses. A lot of parents could not afford to get their kids proper eye check-up much more afford a decent pair of glasses. Spectacles aims to solve that problem.

On the second year of its implementation, JCI Cagayan de Oro, Inc. opened to other schools outside Cagayan de Oro City and adding the "beyond borders" Slogan. Since then, we have discovered that joining forces with other JCI local organizations would lessen the work load and

screening process thus creating greater impact not only in Cagayan de Oro but also to its neighbouring towns and cities. For this JCI year, we partnered with Cataract Foundation Philippines, Inc., an organization that has similar views in helping under-privileged high school students for the free lens and frame. Other JCI chapters like JCI Bukidnon Maragway, JCI Panguil Bay, JCI Iligan Inc., and JCI Greater Pagadian also collaborated in doing joint eye glasses provisions in their areas.

Last December 2017, JCI Cagayan de Oro, Inc. travelled to the Islamic City of Marawi, Lanao del Sur to answer the call to help the recent war victims of the siege. Seven schools were catered.

Other area-beneficiaries included Camiguin Island and Pagadian City.

It is an awareness campaign that introduces and educates the different situations of women across the society and hopefully as a result would create a dialogue between the leaders and the community.

This is a project that aims to increase membership growth and empowerment of females within the organization - built with a strategic set of activities that would inspire

WHAT IS PINAY POWER?

A national Project of JCI Philippines, Pinay Power started with two of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals namely: Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all (#4) and Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls (#5). HISTORY

BTS was proposed as a National Flagship program during the 2014 NB Special planning in Iloilo (Oct 2013). It was approved during the 1st NB of 2014 under the leadership of then National President Christine Garcia. BTS continues to be a national project that promotes members to be active and stay active, and brings hope and inspiration to the younger generation to be productive and become the future active citizens.

WHAT IS BAGS TO SCHOOL?

Bags to School (BTS) is one of the flagship projects of Junior Chamber International Philippines, Inc. This project aims to promote primary education nationwide in line with UN-SDG's Quality Education campaign, i.e., ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all, particularly children in stressed areas. JCI Bicol Region is composed of 3 provinces namely Albay, Camarines Sur, and Camarines Norte. Each province has 4 Local Organizations. Albay is located at the south part of the region while Camarines Norte is on the north and Camarines Sur is in between.

Having this kind of geographical setting, it is quite hard to conduct Regional Trainings. JCI Bicol Region simultaneously conducted Official Courses such as Achieve and Impact last January 13, 2018. Albay held it at Bigg's Diner, Daraga while Camarines Sur was at KJA Hotel, Naga City and Diego's Grill, Daet in Camarines Norte.

The objectives of this Regional Training are (1) to produce new batches of eligible trainers, (2) activate more eligible trainers, and (3) for the members to have a deeper understanding of what JCI is.
